

20161024	48. Mr CHAN Chi-chuen opined that no matter how many	Waste
	OWTFs would be built, efforts in food waste treatment would	
	be futile without mandatory food waste source separation. He	
	enquired about the Administration's plan, if any, for studying	
	the feasibility of mandatory food waste source separation.	
20161219	11. Mr CHAN Chi-chuen suggested that the Administration	Waste
	should take forward some immediate measures such as	
	publishing online the locations of black spots of illegal land	
	filling and fly-tipping to facilitate public monitoring.	
20170227	47. Mr CHAN Chi-chuen said that at the meeting of the Panel	Misc
	on Transport held on 24 February 2017, HyD advised that the	
	resident site staff engaged by HyD had observed the Seawall	
	Incidents but HyD did not consider it necessary to inform EPD	
	or the public about the Incidents. Mr CHAN and Ms MO	
	expressed concern whether the notification mechanism and	
	the environmental monitoring data in the EM&A Reports	
	submitted by HyD were sufficient for EPD to monitor and	
	follow up timely and effectively incidents that might	
	potentially have an adverse impact on the environment.	
20170327	20. Mr CHAN Chi-chuen raised concern about "double	Waste
	charging" arising from the implementation of MSW charging	
	since he considered that rates had already covered the waste	
	collection services provided by the Government. Mr CHAN	
	pointed out that in the last legislative term, the Panel had	
	passed a motion demanding the Government to lower the	
	rates concurrently to avoid double levy if quantity-based	
	waste charging was to be introduced.	
20170327	22. Mr CHAN Chi-chuen stated that the People Power	Waste
	considered mandatory waste separation at source should be	
	taken forward in parallel with implementation of MSW	
	charging such that only those MSW to be disposed of after	
	source separation would need to be charged.	
20170522	37. Noting that four different Government Departments (MD,	Water
	LCSD, AFCD and the Food and Environmental Hygiene	
	Department) were each responsible for removal of marine	
	refuse under their respective purviews, Mr CHAN Chi-chuen	

	enquired about how to deal with cases when it was unclear as	
	to which department was responsible for removal of the	
	marine refuse concerned.	
20171127	23. Mr CHAN Chi-chuen pointed out that the recyclables	Waste
	exported from Hong Kong to the Mainland for recycling should	
	not be regarded as "foreign rubbish", since according to the	
	Basic Law, the Hong Kong Special Administrative Region was	
	an inalienable part of the People's Republic of China.	
20171127	36. Noting that about 92.6% of plastic recyclables in Hong	Waste
	Kong had been exported to the Mainland, Mr CHAN Chi-	
	chuen called for the Administration's actions in the short,	
	medium and long term to assist local recyclers in meeting the	
	tightened import requirements of the Mainland from January	
	2018. Noting that a funding of \$20 million had been	
	earmarked under the Recycling Fund for recyclers to procure	
	facilities for upgrading their capability in processing local	
	recyclables, he enquired about the number of waste plastic	
	recyclers which had received funding support under the	
	Recycling Fund in order to meet the Mainland import	
	requirements, and their capability in handling the waste	
	plastics recyclables in Hong Kong.	
20180122	23. Noting that cantilevered noise barriers or vertical noise	Misc
	barriers would be retrofitted at certain road sections under	
	the proposed works, including a section of cantilevered noise	
	barrier to be retrofitted along the verge of the southbound	
	carriageway adjacent to Scenery Court, Mr LEUNG Yiu-chung	
	enquired about the reasons for not adopting semi-enclosures	
	or full enclosures thereat instead with a view to better	
	mitigating the traffic noise impact on neighbouring residents.	
	Mr CHAN Chi-chuen shared similar concern.	
20180326	25. Referring to media reports that the recipient of a	Waste
	Reinstatement Notice for illegal land filling on a private land	
	lot in Sha Ling had failed to comply with the notice by the	
	expiry date, Mr CHU Hoi-dick and Mr CHAN Chi-chuen sought	
	details on the reinstatement requirements and the follow-up	
	actions taken/to be taken by PlanD on the non-compliance.	
	Mr CHAN further asked whether, in the event of non-	
	compliance with a Reinstatement Notice, the Administration	

	could reinstate the land and recover the expenses incurred	
20400625	from the notice recipient.	
20180625	16. Mr CHAN Chi-chuen sought clarification on the definition	Air
	of "Hong Kong-owned factories" under [Cleaner Production	
	Partnership Programme (CPPP)]. Given that large enterprises	
	and their subsidiaries should have ample resources to	
	upgrade their production processes to achieve [cleaner	
	production (CP)], he questioned the appropriateness of	
	sponsoring the CP projects of those enterprises through CPPP,	
	and enquired whether the eligibility criteria for funding	
	support included the financial strength of the enterprises.	
20180625	19. Mr CHAN Chi-chuen and Mr CHU Hoi-dick enquired how	Air
	the Administration evaluated the effectiveness of [Cleaner	
	Production Partnership Programme] in promoting	
	investments in [cleaner production (CP)] technologies and	
	practices, and whether there were cases where a	
	demonstration project had successfully encouraged the	
	participating factory to make follow-up investments in CP or	
	inspired other factories to adopt the same	
	technology/practice.	
20180625	33. Mr CHAN Chi-chuen asked why some species of volatile	Air
	organic compounds ("VOCs") under the alternative	
	compliance arrangement for the "total VOC" parameter in the	
	[indoor air quality] objectives would be removed.	
20181022	14. Mr CHAN Chi-chuen also enquired if the Administration	Waste
	could undertake to introduce the [Waste Disposal (Charging	
	for Municipal Solid Waste) (Amendment) Bill] by end 2018.	
20181022	16. Mr CHAN Chi-chuen and Mr WU Chi-wai asked whether	Waste
	and when the Administration would study the formulation of	
	policies on mandatory source separation of waste, which they	
	considered a necessary complementary measure to MSW	
	charging.	
20181022	41. Mr CHAN Chi-chuen asked what ENB would do to	Water
	strengthen nature conservation in South Lantau, and mitigate	
	the marine ecological impact arising from the reclamation	
	works in the central waters between Hong Kong Island and	
	Lantau if the proposed project of constructing artificial islands	
	there was approved.	

20181126	31. Mr CHAN Chi-chuen questioned the effectiveness of MSW	Waste
	charging in reducing waste and indicated that he would	
	maintain his reservation about the proposed MSW charging	
	scheme unless a timetable was put in place for the	
	implementation of mandatory source separation of waste.	
20181126	46. Mr CHAN Chi-chuen also expressed concerns about the	Waste
	possible difficulties in taking enforcement actions against non-	
	compliances, and that conflicts might arise between waste	
	producers and frontline enforcement officers or property	
	management companies.	
20181126	55. Mr CHAN Chi-chuen sought elaboration on the financial	Waste
	implications of implementing the proposed MSW charging	
	scheme, including whether it would be revenue neutral in the	
	sense that all charges collected would be ploughed back to	
	waste reduction and recycling work. He also asked why there	
	would not be a reduction in government rates to offset MSW	
	charges, even though the charges for waste collection had	
	already been included in the government rates.	
20190325	5. Quoting paragraph 18 of the digest of the Working Group's	Air
	fourth meeting (Appendix K to Annex A to LC Paper No.	
	CB(1)723/18-19(03)), Ms Tanya CHAN questioned whether	
	the purpose of setting AQOs was to protect public health or	
	merely provide a benchmark for consideration of designated	
	projects under the environmental impact assessment ("EIA")	
	process. She voiced concern that if AQOs mainly served the	
	latter purpose, then the Administration might deliberately	
	adopt less stringent standards with a view to ensuring that	
	designated projects could comply with AQOs. The Deputy	
	Chairman and Mr CHAN Chi-chuen expressed similar	
	concerns.	
20190325	20. Mr CHAN Chi-chuen enquired about the causes of the high	Air
	levels of O3 in Tung Chung and Tap Mun; whether cross-	
	boundary vehicular traffic and construction works in the	
	Guangdong-Hong Kong-Macao Greater Bay Area were major	
	emission sources of O3 affecting Tung Chung; and why the	
	Administration decided not to tighten the AQO for O3 in the	
	current review exercise.	
20190429	19. Mr CHAN Chi-chuen pointed out that according to the	Waste

	original proposal for setting up the Recycling Fund (i.e.	
	FCR(2015-16)25), a cash flow of around \$200 million a year	
	was expected for the 2017-2018 to 2019-2020 financial years.	
	However, only \$152 million of funding had been approved as	
	at the end of March 2019, which fell far short of expectation.	
	He enquired whether the Administration had plans to further	
	relax the application criteria and funding limit for each	
	applicant in future, so that the remaining balance of the Fund	
	would be fully utilized by the end of its operational period.	
20191017	13b. Environmental impact of the use of tear gas: on behalf of	Air
	Mr CHAN Chi-chuen, Ms Tanya CHAN suggested that the	
	Administration should brief the Panel on the environmental	
	and health impacts of the frequent use of tear gas in the	
	community in recent months, and how it would tackle the	
	environmental pollution, if any, caused by tear gas residues.	
20191216	16. Expressing concern about the impact of the emissions	Air
	from crossboundary vehicles on local air quality, Mr CHAN	
	Chi-chuen enquired about the progress of the Mainland	
	authorities in controlling vehicular emissions.	
20191216	21. Mr CHAN Chi-chuen noted from page 11 of LC Paper No.	Air
	CB(1)260/19-20(01) that the dioxins level at the	
	Central/Western monitoring station in November 2019 was	
	proportionally much higher than the levels in October 2019	
	and November 2018. He asked whether the spike was	
	attributed to the use of tear gas, and if so, what follow-up	
	actions had been taken by the Administration to safeguard the	
	environment and public health. He considered that EPD	
	should study the chemical composition of tear gas used in	
	Hong Kong and the environmental impact of tear gas residues.	
20200427	31. Mr CHAN Chi-chuen noted that litter bins formerly placed	Waste
	along hiking trails in country parks had been removed in	
	recent years as an initiative to encourage the public to take	
	their own litter away after visiting country parks. As he	
	observed that there were influxes of visitors to country parks	
	recently following the COVID-19 outbreak, which gave rise to	
	environmental hygiene problems, he asked about the	
	following issues:	
	(a) the manpower arrangements for maintaining	

environmental hygiene in country parks, including whether volunteers had been/would be routinely engaged for waste removal in country parks after peak seasons for outdoor activities and large-scale events taken place in country parks; and

(b) whether the Administration would consider placing litter bins back at selected locations in country parks as appropriate to improve the environmental hygiene conditions at those locations.
