

Bills Committee on Waste Disposal (Charging for Municipal Solid Waste) (Amendment) Bill 2018

20181205	1.	Mr CHU asked whether the Administration (a) had gauged public		
		opinions on the proposed charging scheme, and (b) would review		
		the general space and facility requirements for the recovery of		
		recyclables in the community.		
20190107	2.	Mr CHU enquired whether the Environment Bureau ("ENB") had		
		plans to review the Waste Disposal Ordinance (Cap. 354) with a		
		view to enhancing the regulatory regime for the disposal of		

- construction waste, in the light of the court's recent decision on a judicial review in respect of the deposit of construction waste on private lots.
- 3. **Mr CHU** questioned the Administration's capability in enforcing the proposed charging scheme, as there were media reports that some private waste collectors passed off construction waste as commercial and industrial waste and disposed of it at landfills to evade the construction waste charge.
- 4. **Mr CHU** further enquired why the review of the regulatory regime for the disposal of construction waste involved the Sustainable Lantau Office, and whether the improvements to be introduced to the regulatory regime would be applied to Lantau only.
- 5. **Mr CHU** sought explanation on whether a person would commit any offence if he/she removed the packaging materials of a product purchased from a retailer and disposed of or left the materials inside the retailer's premises without wrapping them in a DB. He also asked whether the Administration would consider requiring retailers to reduce the use of packaging materials.
- 6. Mr CHU expressed disappointment about the lack of progress in revamping the designs and functions of RCPs even though such issues had been discussed by the Subcommittee on Refuse Collection and Resource Recovery under the Panel on Environmental Affairs in the 2016-2017 legislative session. He suggested that:
 - (a) the Administration should consider merging EPD with FEHD, with a view to tackling waste management and climate change issues in a holistic manner; and
