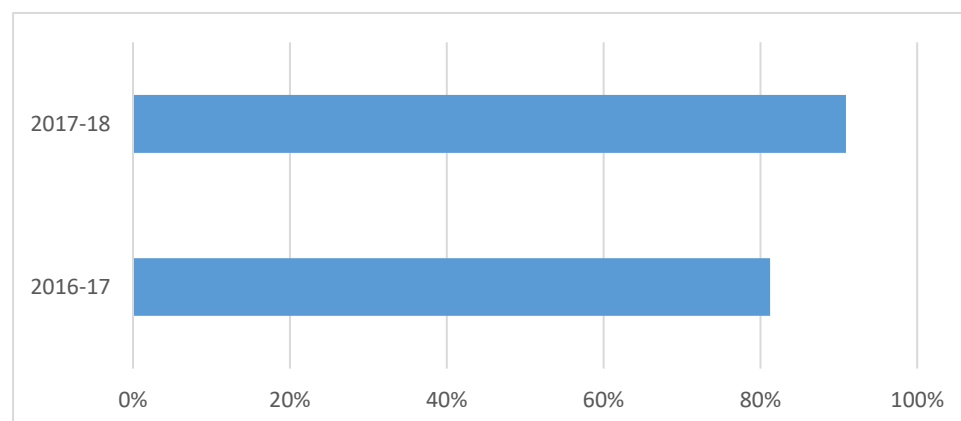

#### Panel on Environmental Affairs

20161219	5. <b>Mr LEUNG Yiu-chung</b> criticized the deficient regulatory regime for handling illegal land filling on both government and private lands. He considered it imperative for the Administration to take stern actions to deal with the existing cases of illegal land filling, and prevent emergence of new cases.	Waste
20161219	14. <b>Mr LEUNG Yiu-chung</b> urged the Administration to review the penalties to enhance deterrent effect against illegal land filling and fly-tipping of C&D waste. In particular, the enforcement departments should trace the responsible persons who had instructed these illegal activities, and impose stiff penalties on such persons.	Waste
20170303	12. <b>Mr LEUNG Yiu-chung</b> asked whether the Administration would consider increasing the penalties for offences relating to illegal land filling. He stressed that the enforcement departments should trace and hold the persons responsible for illegal dumping activities, and request DoJ to appeal against the court's decisions if the penalties imposed by the court were too light. 20170327	24. <b>Mr LEUNG Yiu-chung</b> expressed concern about the unfairness for consumers to pay MSW charges for the waste passively generated from excessive packaging of the products they purchased.	Waste
20170424	19. <b>Mr LEUNG Yiu-chung</b> said that he had no objection to the proposed manpower arrangements. He opined that the Government should hold the manufacturers more responsible for recycling of their products after use by the consumers.	Waste
20170529	4. <b>Mr LEUNG Yiu-chung</b> considered that the existing support facilities for recycling were inadequate. He said that before the implementation of MSW charging, the Administration should provide adequate recycling facilities in the community	Waste

	to facilitate the public to separate waste (including food waste) at source and enhance the collection of recyclable materials. He noted that there were mixed views in the community towards the implementation of MSW charging. He enquired whether the Administration would take account of those views and reconsider the timetable for the implementation of MSW charging.

Noting in paragraph 20 of the Administration's paper (LC Paper No. CB(1)1164/16-17(03)) that the greenhouse gas ("GHG") emissions from transport made up about 16% of the total emissions in Hong Kong, and that the Government would continue to foster a green community by promoting cycling and walking to mitigate GHG emissions, <b>Mr LEUNG Yiu-chung</b> opined that the existing planning standards and supporting measures for fostering a green community, such as providing additional bicycle parking spaces in new development areas, were outdated. He considered that the planning requirements of each community should depend on individual community development, and suggested the Environment Bureau ("ENB") take the lead in implementing suitable measures to ensure that environmental protection plans would be given priority in community development, particularly in new development areas such as Kai Tak. Noting that food waste constituted a substantial part of domestic municipal solid waste ("MSW") in Hong Kong but no complementary support measures on domestic food waste recycling would be introduced alongside the implementation of MSW charging, <b>Mr LEUNG Yiu-chung</b> enquired about the possible measures and incentives to assist and encourage property management companies of public housing estates to enhance food waste recycling. 	36. <b>Mr LEUNG Yiu-chung</b> expressed concern about water quality, the marine refuse problem, and the inter-departmental efforts in tackling marine refuse. SEN responded that a host of measures were implemented to improve water quality and reduce odour problems near coastal waters.	Water
20180122	23. Noting that cantilevered noise barriers or vertical noise	Misc

	barriers would be retrofitted at certain road sections under the proposed works, including a section of cantilevered noise barrier to be retrofitted along the verge of the southbound carriageway adjacent to Scenery Court, <b>Mr LEUNG Yiu-chung</b> enquired about the reasons for not adopting semi-enclosures or full enclosures thereat instead with a view to better mitigating the traffic noise impact on neighbouring residents.	
20180226	6. Ir Dr LO Wai-ki, Dr Elizabeth QUAT, <b>Mr LEUNG Yiu-chung</b> , Mr Steven HO and Mr HUI Chi-fung expressed dissatisfaction that the number of newly registered e-PCs had declined drastically after reduction of the FRT concessions for e-PCs.	Air

The Chairman, Mr Frankie YICK, Dr Elizabeth QUAT, <b>Mr LEUNG Yiu-chung</b> , Mr Steven HO and Mr HUI Chi-fung called on ENB to collaborate with relevant B/Ds (e.g. Home Affairs Bureau) to offer more assistance to current/prospective EV owners in installing EV chargers in existing buildings; offer assistance and incentives to owners' corporations to draw their support for installing EV chargers on their premises; and set a timetable for the development of the EV charging network, including both public and private chargers.	Air

As private car owners might not be able to install EV chargers at their parking spaces due to various constraints while the supply of parking spaces in new housing developments was inadequate, <b>Mr LEUNG Yiu-chung</b> and Mr Steven HO considered it imperative for the Administration to greatly expand the public charging network in order to promote a wider use of e-PCs.	Air
20180326	22. <b>Mr LEUNG Yiu-chung</b> criticized that the prior notification mechanism had failed to prevent environmental pollution caused by land filling activities on private lands. He requested the Administration to explain why it would not consider at the current stage to introduce legislative amendments to increase the penalties on illegal land filling and extend the Planning Department ("PlanD")'s regulatory and enforcement powers to lots in rural areas not covered by Development Permission Area ("DPA") Plans. 20180423	10. <b>Mr LEUNG Yiu-chung</b> expressed concern that the low	Climate

	power generation efficiency, long payback period and large space required for installation of photovoltaic ("PV") systems would discourage members of the public from participating in the FiT Scheme.	
20180423	23. <b>Mr LEUNG Yiu-chung</b> , Mr HUI Chi-fung and Mr Kenneth LAU expressed concern that the existing regulatory requirements regarding the installation of PV systems on building rooftops, etc. were overly restrictive. A case in point was that the height of a PV system erected on a building rooftop could not be higher than 1.5 m. <b>Mr LEUNG</b> , Mr LAU and the Deputy Chairman enquired whether and when the Administration would relax the relevant requirements with a view to promoting the development of distributed RE. 20180423	39. <b>Mr LEUNG Yiu-chung</b> enquired about the reasons for the slow progress in constructing RE facilities on Po Toi Island to replace the existing power generators.	Climate
20180625	12. <b>Mr LEUNG Yiu-chung</b> and Mr CHU Hoi-dick considered that the relevant Mainland authorities, rather than the Hong Kong Government, should bear the responsibility of promoting the adoption of [cleaner production (CP)] by factories in Guangdong and the cost involved, and hence it was questionable whether funding should be provided through CPPP to those Mainland factories for carrying out CP-related projects. <b>Mr LEUNG</b> and the Chairman enquired whether the Mainland authorities concerned had implemented similar initiatives to promote CP. 20180625	35. <b>Mr LEUNG Yiu-chung</b> enquired whether guidelines on improving [indoor air quality (IAQ)] in offices, including those related to the cleaning of MVAC systems and other air conditioning systems, had been issued for public reference; and whether subsidies would be provided to employers for the adoption of good IAQ management practices in their offices and/or joining the Scheme. 20180719	20. Apart from imposing the levy to recover the cost of the collection and treatment of waste glass containers, Mr CHAN Hak-kan, Mr CHU Hoi-dick and <b>Mr LEUNG Yiu-chung</b> asked whether the Administration would implement other measures to more proactively encourage local beverage	Waste

	manufacturers and other suppliers to reuse the glass beverage containers through re-bottling.	
20180719	30. <b>Mr LEUNG Yiu-chung</b> opined that the Administration should provide the list of collection points for public information to facilitate recovery of waste glass containers.	Waste
