20171108	1. <b>Mr TO</b> expressed the following views/concerns: (a) the Administration should explore the feasibility of registering legal ivory stockpile held by local traders/practitioners by means of
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	<p>advanced technologies (such as permanent marking or use of less intrusive means) before consideration of imposing a total ban on ivory trade; and</p> <p>(b) possible effect of the Bill of limiting the property right of the ivory traders/practitioners without compensation and whether passage of the Bill would set a precedent in law and could be subject to legal challenge.</p> <p>2. <b>Mr TO</b> and Dr HO expressed concern about the possible effect of the Bill of limiting the property right of the ivory traders/practitioners without compensation. They sought ALA's comments on the Administration's view that the legislative proposal set out in the Bill was in conformity with Articles 6 and 105 of the Basic Law ("BL") on protection of the right of private ownership of property.</p>
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
